Since the college has four (4) UG BOS members in the University of Kalyani, syllabi of subjects including Zoology, History, Communicative English & Environmental Studies are developed in consultation with related teachers.

#### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Remedial Classes benefitted SC/ST/OBC/Minority Students of English, Bengali, History, Geography, Political Sc. , Chemistry and Zoology.

Departments conduct tests periodically in accordance with the directives of the affiliating University. Project works are assigned to the students. Field surveys and educational tours are conducted as and when required. Departments maintained two wall magazines on relevant topics this session as well.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Departments conduct tests periodically in accordance with the directives of the affiliating University.

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

Teachers are encouraged to do MRP, attend/present papers in seminars and conferences and go for research paper publications. One teacher of the college is having four research fellows presently. Some teachers are pursuing their Ph.Ds as well. One teacher is doing Ph. D. under FIP scheme.

#### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library has substantial amount of books. INFLIBNET's subscription has been renewed. NME Scheme of Broad band Services are running. DVDs and CDs are possessed by some departments and films based on texts of syllabi are shown. Thirteen new laptops have been provided to the teachers primarily to be used as teaching aids. Teachers also use PPT and web based study materials in class room teaching. There are browsing centres in the college to aid the students.

#### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Teachers Council organised recreation programmes including staff picnic. The co-operative society provides financial support to the staff as and when required. The college is not empowered to recruit staff in vacancies against substantive posts. However casual appointments are periodically made to meet with the academic and administrative requirements.

As per guidelines of the affiliating University admission is conducted by the Admission Sub-committee. The staff of the college assist to smoothly conduct admission. Fee structures for admission and other norms are displayed on the college notice board as well as the college website.

## 8. Plans of institution for next year

The institution wishes to expand activities of Entry in Service Cell for SC, ST, OBC and Minority students and also make Remedial Classes for SC, ST, OBC and Minority students more inclusive despite paucity of staff and the obvious limitations of being located in a semi-urban locale with a majority population of first-generation learners. Publication of Faculty members must also be increased. Number of sensitization programme and seminars should increase.

## Session: 2013 – 14

Drawbacks	Need more classrooms, lack of faculty members in almost departments(particularly in English, Mathematics, Botany and commerce departments), insufficient guest lecturers and poor standard of teaching of guest lecturers in most cases, need renovation of canteen totally & very poor services of canteen, lack of sufficient sports materials and communication from home to college and vice- versa is very problematic. Library facilities need to be more dynamic. College library is required to be updated. Accessing INFLIBNET at home after college hours is a problem for most of the students as they live in remote villages.
Positive	Workloads undertaken by the permanent faculty members particularly by the single permanent faculty member are extremely praiseworthy. Completion of syllabus is made in due time. Some teachers have taken extra classes for the benefit of students. Departmental library is very useful. Most teachers are available after scheduled classes, if necessary. College provides First-aid, if necessary. Activity of NSS of the college unit for cleanliness of the campus is exemplary. Discipline in college hostel is properly maintained. Recreational facilities are outstanding. Practical work of each department is satisfactory. Departmental library is helpful. INFLIBNET facility is extremely beneficial. Evaluation is good.

Comment & Evaluation: Grievances by the students seem justified and solutions to these

issues would be taken up in the next academic session.

#### **BEST PRACTICE: I**

## Title: Seminar on Women and Panchayat; Date: 21/11/2013

#### Goal:

The primary objective of the programme was to sensitize the girl students about the importance of their political participation in rural decision making bodies. Particularly the goals and objectives are fourfold:

- 1. To develop the ability among the girl students to identify at least three advantages and three disadvantages of being an active participant in rural Panchayat
- 2. To understand the importance of women's' participation in decision making bodies.
- 3. To give practical knowledge about the norms of good governance in rural Panchayat.
- 4. To develop the ability to comment and to give constructive feedbacks to facilitator.

#### **Context:**

A Panchayat, in the traditional sense, is a body of 5 elders of the village who help to resolve conflict amongst the villagers. In pre-independence India, legal provisions made it difficult for women to participate actively in politics. For instance, the Bombay Village Panchayat Act, 1920 stipulated that no female could become an elected member. In the light of these historical circumstances, one can quite categorically say that the 73<sup>rd</sup> Amendment Act, 1992, mandating reservation in at least 1/3<sup>rd</sup> of the seats of all Panchayat Councils and 1/3<sup>rd</sup> of the Pradhan (head of the Panchayat) positions for women, was a landmark for women's political empowerment. In addition, Bihar became the 1<sup>st</sup> state to reserve 50% of seats for women with Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, and Rajasthan & Himachal Pradesh following suit. Numerically today India can actually boast that there are more elected women representatives (EWRs) in India than the rest of the world put together. Keeping this luminous background in mind, the Equal Opportunity Cell (EOC) in Jangipur College organized a sensitization and awareness campaign on women's political participation campaign so that they act proudly as an important stakeholder of democracy rather than proxy women.

#### **Practice:**

This campaign tried to impart knowledge about the importance of women's participation in grass root democracy, the probable hurdles toward participation and also the way outs to overcome those hurdles. The facilitators arranged power point presentation, flow charts, role plays and other activities to analyze the issue rather than lectures held by the seminar leaders. This atmosphere helped them to construct a good argument for their preference. The cell approached two elected women Panchayat members to act as a facilitator along with college teachers. Their participation and valuable inputs made the campaign more meaningful. There was no registration fee for the students and the teachers took part without any remuneration and without hampering their and normal duties. It would have been better if we could arrange a road show on the subject but keeping the security issue in mind we rejected the idea.

#### **Evidence of Success:**

The overall reaction of the students was encouraging for the cell. This campaign was second of the series organized by Equal Opportunity Cell and the students showed their interest for further proceedings. The campaign helped them to understand the basics of Panchayat and the importance of participatory democracy. They got some idea on ongoing government programmes that certainly increased their consciousness level about political participation of women.

## **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:**

The participants were reluctant to come forward particularly in case of role play. They were hesitating to express their own feelings. There was language problem also. They were unable to talk properly even in their mother tongue. Funding remained a concern for this project.

#### **BEST PRACTICE: II**

#### Title: Entry in Services; Year: 2013-2014

#### Goal:

The goal of this programme is to instil self-esteem and competence in the mind-set of the noncreamy layered students of the institution. Jangipur-subdivision in the district of Murshidabad, West Bengal where Jangipur College is located, happens to inhabit a vast section of SC/ST/OBC and Muslim population. Parents of such students are mostly day-labours or *bidi* workers. Entry in Service Cell in Jangipur College endeavours to uplift the morale and level of competence of the wards of such parents by making them aware about the various career opportunities that await them after the completion of their under graduate degree courses.

#### The Context:

Given that the scenario of employment opportunities in the country is still bleak, the most crucial question that a non-creamy layered student encounters during the final years of his/her under graduate studies is what to do next! He/she almost always being a first generation learner as well the gloom of being unemployed looms larger for him/her. Keeping this context in mind, Entry in Service Cell of Jangipur College tries primarily to enhance the student's capacity building acumen. He/she receives inputs to develop skills that would make him/her negotiate the job market with relatively higher degree of confidence and competence.

## The Practice:

Entry in Service Cell in Jangipur College is peopled with extremely dedicated, compassionate and well-informed faculty. Since the college is situated in a semi-urban locale with a relatively higher percentage of illiterate or semi-literate parents, the most obvious impediment is make their wards realize the worth of taking a training for jobs along with on-going syllabi oriented formal mode of under graduate studies. Lack of exposure to the outer world deters the student from diversifying his/her perspective about the job-world. Where the most basic means and amenities of living are unavailable, it seems, initially at least, to be a wastage of time and energy for most of the non-creamy layered students to undergo a training course on top of the scheduled classes that under graduate curriculum entails. Such students consider it more profitable to rush back home at the earliest opportunity where they would assist their parents in tilting or in *bidi-binding*. In order to

mitigate this problem Entry in Service Cell has made the training classes flexible: teachers take such classes when both they and their students are free often during college hours. Once the students start doing these classes, gradually they realize how beneficial these classes are and then on student attendance percentage and interest in the courses offered increases. However, a significant impediment still remains on the part of the students and that is the utter lack of basic knowledge in handling computers/internet. Teachers do their best to instil a minimum degree of expertise in handling computers on their students but one has to admit that more often than not such efforts do not yield noteworthy results. Communicative English is another such area which still requires attention. Finally, given the paucity of faculty strength in Jangipur College, lack of human resource often becomes a serious deterrent in a more effective running of the Entry in Service Cell in Jangipur College.

## **Evidence of Success:**

If success is to be measured in terms of quantitative data, Entry in Service Cell, Jangipur College is yet to yield any result worth mentioning. As of now the Cell is doing its best to design/modify/upgrade itself in terms of formulating its resources that would suit best the noncreamy layered, extremely poverty stricken, computer illiterate, first generation learners. The faculty does a voluntary service simply out of love, compassion and concern for its students. Qualitatively, however, the Cell can boast of having been able to instil in its students a relatively higher degree of confidence and competence level which would enable them to give the job-market at least a try rather than joining the ancestral profession of fishing or tilting or in *bidi-binding*.

## **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:**

Computer illiteracy, deep rooted fear of failure in competing in the job-market, lack of any ability to communicate in English and the like are the prime problems that the non-creamy layered students presently have. To help overcome these impediments is the most significant challenge that Entry in Service Cell is presently encountering. The remote location of the college does not help either in obtaining experts to teach specialized areas of learning. Moreover there is a severe dearth of permanent faculty members in various departments which can hardly be compensated with Guest Lecturers.

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
