2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

IQAC ensured that academic and administrative health of the college remained sound. Admission, teaching-learning process, examination, cultural activities and games & sports were the prime focus. Remedial classes and Entry-into- Services continued in this session as well albeit zero recruitment. IQAC introduced online admission process from this session. Students of our college participated in Youth Parliament Competition and Quiz competition sponsored by D. I. of Schools, Govt. of West Bengal & Department of Parliamentary Affairs, Govt. of West Bengal (Presidency Level). Three institutional seminars marked this session. Equal Opportunity Cell organized a sensitization programme on "Third Gender". The college organised "National Robotics Workshop and Championship" in collaboration with A. R. K. Techno solutions and I. I. T. Mumbai. NSS surveyed a local village Muhammadpur, Murshidabad. Entry in Services Cell invited Ananda Bazar Patrika (ABP) to conduct a Workshop-cum-Campaign interview to select candidates for employment in ABP. IQAC undertook CAS of thirteen teachers. FIP of one teacher is continuing.

Since the college has three (3) UG BOS members in the University of Kalyani, syllabi of subjects including History, Communicative English & Environmental Studies are developed in consultation with related teachers.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Remedial Classes benefitted SC/ST/OBC/Minority Students of English, Bengali, History, Geography, Political Sc., Chemistry and Zoology.

Departments conduct tests periodically in accordance with the directives of the affiliating University. Project works are assigned to the students. Field surveys and educational tours are conducted as and when required. Departments maintained two wall magazines on relevant topics this session as well.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Departments conduct tests periodically in accordance with the directives of the affiliating University.

6.3.4 Research and Development

Teachers are encouraged to do MRP, attend/present papers in seminars and conferences and go for research paper publications. One teacher of the college is having four research fellows presently. Some teachers are pursuing their Ph.D. as well. One teacher is doing Ph. D. under FIP scheme.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library has substantial amount of books. INFLIBNET's subscription has been renewed. NME Scheme of Broad band Services are running. DVDs and CDs are possessed by some departments and films based on texts of syllabi are shown. Teachers also use PPT and web based study materials in class room teaching. There are browsing centres in the college to aid the students.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Teachers Council organised recreation programmes including staff picnic.

The co-operative society provides financial support to the staff as and when required.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The college is not empowered to recruit staff in vacancies against substantive posts. However casual appointments are periodically made to meet with the academic and administrative requirements.

Students' Feedback Analysis

Session: 2014 - 15

Drawbacks	Main problem is classroom and shortage of teaching staff. Lack of faculty members in almost departments(particularly in English, Mathematics, Botany and commerce departments), insufficient guest lecturers and poor standard of teaching of guest lecturers in most cases, need renovation of canteen totally & very poor services of canteen, shortage of hostel staff, lack of sufficient sports materials and communication from home to college and vice-versa is very problematic. Library facilities need to be more dynamic. College library is required to be more modernized. Accessing INFLIBNET at home after college hours is a problematic for most of the students as they live in remote villages.
Positive	Commencement of Online Admission process in the college is highly acceptable subject. Workloads undertaken by the permanent faculty members particularly by the single permanent faculty member are extremely praiseworthy. Completion of syllabus is made in due time. Some teachers have taken extra classes after their scheduled classes for the benefit of students before final examination. Departmental library is very useful. Most teachers are available after scheduled classes, if necessary. First-aid, if necessary, is very useful. Activity of NSS of the college unit for cleanliness of the campus is exemplary. Discipline in college hostel is properly maintained. Recreational facilities are outstanding. Practical work of each department is satisfactory. Departmental library is helpful. INFLIBNET facility is extremely beneficial. Evaluation process is good.

Comment & Evaluation: Grievances by the students seem justified and solutions to these

issues would be taken up in the next academic session.

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Annexure - IV

BEST PRACTICE: I

Title: Sensitization and Awareness Campaign on 'Third Gender'

Date: 06/09/2014

Goal:

The goal of the programme was to provide a forum to discuss and analyse the problems and challenges of third gender and their social inclusion. There are enough evidences in history about the acceptance of third gender in social processes. The religious scripture of *Mahavarata* told the story of Shikhandi (prince of Panchala), Brihannalla (the character of Arjun in *aggyatabasinViratcourt*) who belonged in the social mainstream but subsequently with the passage of time they were totally excluded and denied basic respect as a human being. Seldom, our society realizes or cares to realize the trauma, agony and pain which the members of Transgender community neither undergo, nor appreciate the innate feelings of the members of the Transgender community, especially of those whose mind and body disown their biological sex. The equal opportunity cell (EOC) tried to inculcate in the students an unbiased approach towards this vulnerable section of society.

Context:

Our society often ridicules and abuses the Transgender community. And in public places like railway stations, bus stands, schools, workplaces, malls, theatres, hospitals, they are sidelined and treated as untouchables, forgetting the fact that the moral failure lies in the society's unwillingness to absorb or embrace different gender identities and expressions. Mindsets need to change. In November 2009, India agreed to list eunuchs and transgender people as "others", distinct from males and females, in voting rolls and voter identity cards. On April 15, 2014, the Supreme Court of India recognized a third gender that is neither male nor female, and as a class entitled to reservation in education and jobs, stating "Recognition of transgender as a third gender is not a social or medical issue but a human rights issue." So the programme is more contextual and relevant in the light of such judgement.

Practice:

The EOC provided a scope for students to know about this upcoming subject which is gaining a universal appeal day by day. They shared their own views that mostly resembled myopic vision of the society about third-gender. Since the subject is a new one the initial reactions were strongly adverse. However, keeping in mind the modern day approach to the subject, later they were eager to get right information. The teachers took part without any remuneration and without hampering their class schedule and normal duties. To make the programme inclusive, there was no registration fee for the students

The crux of the matter was to deal with such a complex and conflicting issue in a rural area. It was very challenging to bring the students from the mode of rejection to acceptance level. It would have

been better if we could arrange a lecture presentation by an external resource person who belongs to either a third gender or transgender group.

Evidence of Success:

The impact of the programme was not at par with expectations but we were enabled to raise the curiosity level of the students. However this was the first take of an unconventional issue in the college level. At least a favourable ambience could be created for the students so that they could share their queries on the issue. This is an enough of a path-breaking ground for raising awareness on this topic. As humans, we understand little about our complex bodies. The best thing about the campaign was that it gave a value-added option to the students to get a clear perception on the subject which apparently seemed vague and off the block.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Since the students in our college come from rural areas, there is dearth of knowledge on this issue completely. Secrecy and stigma hold them back. However, the silver lining behind the dark clouds is that the awareness campaign has helped the students to understand that as a human being, everyone deserves a feeling of "belonging", understanding and acceptance. It would also add value to the campaign if we could get expertise at national level. In altering traditional stereotypes, a transition from traditional concealment-based approach to a patient-giver approach is required. To mitigate the hazards of a biased approach, funds are required to fetch greater expertise.

BEST PRACTICE: II

Title: Survey of Muhammadpur Village, Murshidabad; Date: 25.03.15

Goal:

The goal of the programme was to provide a platform to discuss and analyse the problems and challenges of the village of Muhammadpur, Murshidabad. It's a common knowledge that rural areas feel neglected and need immediate attention, more so in the backward districts of West Bengal. Accrual of assets from such areas was really stimulating.

The Context:

Being a college that is largely rural based, it's natural for our college to keep the socio-economic background in mind while conducting various surveys on issues that affect the rural mass. The NSS unit of Jangipur College had visited this particular village in Murshidabad which is well-known for encountering various inconsolable problems. Different surveys have been conducted on health, hygiene, sanitation, underage marriages, lack of empowered women, etc.

The Practice:

Under the able-guidance of the program officers, a group of students of NSS units visited the Muhammadpur village, Murshidabad. They sought the help of the Block Development Officers to ensure the assistance of the local level government employees deployed in different sections. The various programmes taken were keeping in confidence of the local Panchayat authority. The activities taken up by the NSS units were as varied and diverse as awareness programs and surveys in the said village on blood donation, female foeticide, child marriages, reproductive health of women, hygiene, sanitation, environment etc. Surveys were also conducted on rural employment opportunities of the concerned village and skill development programmes were launched for the villagers.

Evidence of Success:

The impact of the programme was immense. After the surveys were made, there has been a noticeable change in the attitudes of the villagers. The initial apathy has been erased. The confidence of the villagers has increased and they are eager to be a part of such surveys in future. The results indicate a clear presence of visionary approach on the part of the NSS to better the livelihood of the members of the village.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

To harness the economic potential of the aforementioned village, human and finance capital have to be properly utilised. Self –help groups can work in tandem with NSS unit to make a greater change and make the changes impactful en masse for the stakeholders.

Fund is always criteria for implementation of surveys and strategic risk-taking is required for make such surveys effective. The problems of rural areas are more difficult to resolve than the urban areas goes without mentioning. Therefore, it's doubly challenging to transform villages and retain the alterations made in a sustainable dynamic atmosphere. There are external triggers like rocky economic cycle to keep the social glitches alive.

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
