

IQAC ensured that academic and administrative health of the college remained sound. Apart from admission, ICT-based teaching-learning process, examination, sports and cultural activities, IQAC saw to it that Remedial Classes and Entry-in-Services continued in spite of no recruitment. Students participated in various state-level cultural activities and were awarded. To strengthen ICT 38 computers were added. Construction of classrooms in the 2nd floor of the Main Building has been initiated. Besides, the regular extension activities of NSS, Women's Cell and Equal Opportunity Centre(EOC), the Department of Political Science organized an interactive awareness campaign entitled: 'Juvenile Crime: A Multidimensional Perspective'. To have uninterrupted power supply two green generators have been installed. Goes without saying all the recommendations of IQAC were ratified by the Governing Body and initiatives were taken to implement them.






5.4 Details of student support mechanism for coaching for competitive examinations (If any)



6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision:The vision of the college is to disseminate quality education and produce responsible citizens of the country who in turn would nurture the rich-composite culture of the nation. The college has received recognition of UGC under Section 2(f) of the Act and is receiving financial assistance from UGC under Section 12(B). The college offers courses in Arts, Science and Commerce streams at the undergraduate level. The college is affiliated to the University of Kalyani since the year 1999 as per the decision of West Bengal Govt. It is a grant-in-aid institution of the West Bengal government. The College was set up in 1950 with the stated vision of imparting higher education and to contribute to the educational, social, cultural and economic upliftment of the people of Jangipur.

Mission: The mission of the college is to offer innovative and socially relevant skills to our students. We take care to empower our female students and cater to the diverse need of SC, ST, OBC and Minority students. Jangipur College focuses upon imparting education as a life-building, man-making, character-making assimilation of ideas and the students are inspired to discover their innate potential. The college inculcates values of mutual co-operation and contribution towards the society, nation and the world.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information system

No, but the IQAC and GB ensure that information related to various institutional aspects are maintained and made available to the stake holders. The website of the college notifies updated information as and when required. 6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of following:

Since the college has three (3) UG BOS members in the University of Kalyani, syllabi of subjects including English, Chemistry and History, are developed in consultation with related teachers.

Field surveys and educational tours are conducted as and when required. Departments maintained two wall magazines on relevant topics this session to showcase students' creativity.

Teachers are encouraged to do MRP, attend/present papers in seminars and conferences and go for research paper publications. Some teachers are pursuing their PhDs.

The library has weeded-out30572 unusable and outdated books. New purchase of updated books and journals are in the pipeline. Computerization of the library is under process. DVDs and CDs are possessed by some departments and films based on texts of syllabi are shown. Teachers also use PPT and web based study materials in class room teaching. There are browsing centres in the college to aid the students.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Teachers council organised recreation programmes including staff picnic. The co-operative society provides financial support to the staff as and when required.

The college is not empowered to recruit staff in vacancies against substantive posts. However casual appointments are periodically made to meet with the academic and administrative requirements.

Title: Interactive Awareness Campaign on 'Juvenile Crime: A Multidimensional Perspective' Organized by The Department of Political Science, Jangipur College. Date: 12. 12. 2015

Goal:

The goal of the programme was to provide a platform to discuss and analyze the problems and challenges faced by young minds that fall victim to crimes beyond their control. The rising crime rate in society is an issue that raises concern and more so if it is committed by youth. Though any crime is condemnable, juvenile crime is beyond any specific socio-economic compartmentalization. Awareness campaigns are required to alert and awake young minds before they make mistakes and surrender to traps laid in front of them. Following such thread of thoughts, Department of Political Science, Jangipur College, Murshidabad decided to organize an interactive awareness campaign for students as well as teachers as an endeavour to make a difference and take the issue a few notches higher by inviting presentations of resource persons and delegates from different fields of society.

Context:

Juvenile crime is a harsh reality in India. Especially in recent times where criminal offences like murder and gang rape by youth have increased manifold. Indian society is replete with cases where the gross violation of rights by juveniles sends chill down the spine. Most conversations around juvenile crime in recent years have centred on the age of criminality and whether in case such crimes they should be tried in adult courts or not. The dialogue should focus on why youngsters are drawn into this cauldron of crime and what can be done to prevent this. Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act 2015 has been passed by Indian parliament which will allow minors in the age group of 16-18 be tried as adults if they commit heinous crimes. In such context an awareness programme for young minds was a contextual and necessary step in the right direction.

Practice:

The Department of Political Science provided a golden opportunity to students to be participating in this awareness campaign and share their inputs/experiences and in turn get enriched by views of resource persons on this relevant topic that requires spotlight and focus. The interesting aspect of the programme was that student participation from various humanities departments like Bengali, English, History, but also Science stream like Physics, Chemistry, Geography, Economics and Accountancy Honours student who were very eager to register their names as participants for this event. It was very evident that the issue captured the attention of the students as they found it very relevant to ponder upon. What could have made the session further captive to the audience could have been sharing of anecdotes from a young victim/offender on path of rectification.

Evidence of Success:

The high response of the students, their eagerness to learn something relevant to the times and new to them were clear indicators that they felt positively to reach out and understand the depth of this social evil and find solutions to this problem. Title: Female Feticide and its Impact: A Frightful Reality.

Organized by National Social Service, Jangipur College Unit and Women's Cell, Jangipur College.

Date: 23.02.2016

Goal:

Even in these present times when the 'Beti Bachao Beti Padhao' campaign of the Central government gaining momentum to address the skewed sex ratio in India and girl child rights becoming increasingly important to us, death of daughters can't be controlled in our society which fails to take account and recognize half of the population and their rights. Female feticide is rising by leaps and bounds and occurring concurrently with so-called progress of women; even though we encounter success stories of women with grit and determination to excel and fight against all odds. Aborting female foetuses is both practical and socially acceptable in India. The reasons are good enough to analyze but primarily because an hefty amount of dowry has to be given to the bridegroom and family. India has a long history of son preference and killing of girls with tragic and far-reaching consequences. The so-called modern educated families are not far behind in fact they are front-runners and party to this heinous crime of murder of daughters and sex-selective abortion which is a punishable offence in India. Keeping in mind this burning issue, the NSS Jangipur Unit and Women's Cell organized an awareness campaign on female feticide.

Context:

In India most brutal form of killing takes place through elimination of women from the womb itself whether to salvage and save honour of families, feed false pride of family members or as a hate crime against women. Hence raising voice against such an abhorrent practice is very natural. Denying a child the right to be born is most cruel form of offence. This is rising since mid-1990s. Strict laws and penalties are there for violators but there are also ways of escaping them to dodge the police. Various sex-detection centres have sprung up in the name of pathological laboratories and medical centres which maintain a façade in society and are procuring huge profits illegally. This unholy nexus needs to be addressed and perpetrators of this crime booked strictly under laws and punished severely. Contextually this issue has immense value. Technology is an add-on and being used in modern times to camouflage the depth of the violence involved in this and this vicious cycle of crime needs to be broken with immediate effect and girls need to be given their due in society.

Practice:

• Eminent speaker from Child In Need Institute, Ms Minakshi Biswas was invited by the organizers to share her first hand experiences in working on this issue and she revealed stories on working at the grass-root

level and problems encountered in dealing with this on a mass scale. She enthralled the audience which was basically the girl population of our college who listened with rapt attention the gargantuan problem and measures adopted to address it. The CINI, Murshidabad-Nadia unit has been quite active in working to develop awareness amongst villagers to prevent this practice and success stories were shared. However, what was required was a follow-up to revisit such stories for moral boost and capacity building in an age of consumerism and capitalist modernity where we fly past everything and nothing seems to register once it's visible, already seen and heard. What could have been used to give the campaign an extra edge was questionnaire to students and survey their local area problems to gain inputs for future research and documentation.

Evidence of Success:

It was highly a proud moment for the organizers as students response was very positive and high as the room where this awareness campaign was organized had jam-packed audience. The girl students came in huge numbers to listen to the speaker as an external speaker always creates a curiosity level that's unparalleled more so if she/ he is deft in calling the shots. Thankfully it worked in favour of the audience as expectations were very high from them. These issues are swept under the carpet and not discussed in public hardly considered a problem to be focused on. Often the person discussing it faces scathing attacks or becomes butt of jokes in a male-dominated society that takes pride in underplaying such issues.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Female feticide is a topic that is widely recognized as a frightful reality of present times. Therefore, it was assumed that expectations would run high especially among girl students to listen to such a programme which is especially centred on women and their woes. However, problems encountered while conducting such a programme was that so many students needed to be accommodated in the classroom which had a limited capacity for them during the presentation. Also, due to paucity of funds too many speakers could not be invited for the event so diverse views on this theme could not be placed in front of the students. These lacunae could only be addressed through proper infrastructural development and innovative planning before conducting the programme.

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
