Five teachers were recruited against substantive vacancies. Three seminars/ awareness programmes were organized by Equal Opportunity Centre and NSS. The canteen of the college has been refurbished. 6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision: The vision of the college is to disseminate quality education and produce responsible citizens of the country who in turn would nurture the rich-composite culture of the nation. The college has received recognition of UGC under Section 2(f) of the Act and is receiving financial assistance from UGC under Section 12(B). The college offers courses in Arts, Science and Commerce streams at the undergraduate level. The college is affiliated to the University of Kalyani since the year 1999 as per the decision of West Bengal Govt. It is a grant-in-aid institution of the West Bengal government. The College was set up in 1950 with the stated vision of imparting higher education and to contribute to the educational, social, cultural and economic upliftment of the people of Jangipur.

Mission: The mission of the college is to offer innovative and socially relevant skills to our students. We take care to empower our female students and cater to the diverse need of SC, ST, OBC and Minority students. Jangipur College focuses upon imparting education as a life-building, man-making, charactermaking assimilation of ideas and the students are inspired to discover their innate potential. The college inculcates values of mutual co-operation and contribution towards the society, nation and the world.

Field surveys and educational tours are conducted as and when required. Departments maintained two wall magazines on relevant topics this session to showcase students' creativity

The library is now fully automated. Koha-ILS has been launched. 973 reference books have been purchased. The library has subscribed to 7 journals. Photocopying facility has been introduced. DVDs and CDs are possessed by some departments and films based on texts of syllabi are shown. Teachers also use PPT and web based study materials in class room teaching. There are browsing centres in the college to aid the students.

BEST PRACTICE: 1

1. Title: Present Status of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes: Resources and Remedies

Organized by Equal Opportunity Centre (EOC), Jangipur College and National Social Service, Jangipur Unit.

Date: 18. 04.17---22.04.17

Goal:

Development especially human development in broader terms implies development for all and addresses human rights and freedom of choice of all individuals. But marginalization by excluding certain sections of society due to their position and status in the social hierarchy is not only inhuman but it creates imbalance in society. Basic resources and entitlements which guarantee the right to life should be given to all sections of society. The objective of development is to create an enabling environment for people to enjoy a productive, healthy and creative life. However, this objective gets hampered when at the other end of the spectrum, few sections of society are unable to use resources or relatively control their lives. The consequences are ominous for society. Among the marginalized groups the most vulnerable ones are Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes. Historically they have been subjected to worst forms of exploitation. Keeping this thought in consideration, the Equal Opportunity Centre (EOC) and the NSS arranged for a workshopto raise questions and find answers like where do the SCs and STs stand today? Though there has been some improvement in certain spheres and despite some despite some positive changes, the standard of living for these marginalized communities has not improved. Therefore, what minimum needs to be done?

Context:

Marginality is an experience that affects millions of people throughout this world. Through overt actions or tendencies of human societies a section of people always feels deprived as they are perceived as undesirable or without useful functions. In our country there is a history of atrocities practiced on the lower rungs of society that affects their economic well-being, human dignity and physical security. Nevertheless, the Constitution of India has made several provisions for the welfare and upliftment of marginalized groups of society but these measures have fallen short of required rigorous efforts that Central government has taken from time to time recognizing the gaps that are there in the struggling maze of rights of these groups. At policy level these issues have been addressed and through constitutional amendments various steps have been upheld for progress of these groups. One such step is reservation. Contextually therefore elaboration on the present status of SCs and STs is very pertinent.

Practice:

Two eminent external speakers who were invited for the workshop were Mr Basudeb Hui, a theatre activist and EX-member of Nandikar group, founder member of SamatatSanaskriti(a theatre group that works for marginalized section of the community) and Dr AvedanandaPanigrahi, an eminent educational psychotherapist associated with Netaji Subhash Open University. The programme was conducted in the smart class room of the college where students of various departments assembled and got hands-on experience as they got to test their mettle as well as gain knowledge on marginality as a part of theatrical experience through execution of a small play involving them. Dr Panigrahi was also very vocal in educating young minds by throwing light on the pychological aspect of marginalization and ghettoization that affects people en large and creates misunderstandings in them on using their full potential. He gave solutions how to overcome such mindscape through professional healing and therapy.

Evidence of Success:

Such programmes always create great deal of curiosity in students who want a break from their monotonous academic routine which is very much marks and syllabus oriented. Response from students was very positive and they participated in sizeable numbers that led to the success of this noble initiative. Since the module of the presentation was in the framework of a workshop active participation of students as desired in the programme was achieved through their direct involvement and participation as actors in skit that made the whole programme so spontaneous and purposive.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

These initiatives are not once in a while effort but more often than not they become such ones. So, the problem of such workshops is that as they are conducted once in a year sustained effort on that part of the students are not given to keep up the momentum required for the workshop. Therefore, mostly these issue-based programmes are relegated in the background and they get little space in student memory. Throughout the year such workshops need to be organized involving students and teachers so that they also may come up with suggestions and recommendations by higher authority will be helpful in adding the extra pace to such initiatives. In fact, at the end of the workshop suggestions came up from students itself to conduct such workshops with greater frequency and fanfare.

BEST PRACTICE: 2

Title: Title: Awareness Campaign Against Mosquito-borne Diseases
 Organized by National Social Service, Jangipur Unit.

Date.01. 10. 2016

Goal:

The goal of the programme was quite clear—to provide awareness and raise the consciousness level of students regarding mosquito-borne diseases which have emerged as a serious public health problem in India. Considering the concern for the environment that is being deadly polluted in recent years, this issue is more relevant as it aims to prioritize our daily concern for cleaner fresher disease-free surroundings. More so in the state of West Bengal and especially in Murshidabad district which has hot humid weather with heavy rainfall—a perfect breeding ground for mosquitoes that spread diseases like malaria, dengue, chikungunya, encephalitis and yellow fever to name a few. It can be concluded that intensive information, education and communication activities are needed to educate people about mosquito borne diseases and their prevention.

Context:

As already emphasized the reasons for an awareness campaign against mosquito-borne diseases, community health programmes are need of the hour. However what is more essential is to reach out to young minds about deadly diseases that act as catastrophic threats in such cases if awareness is low among us. Raising awareness on diseases by blood sucking pests like mosquitoes would help youth to be more pro-active in the present times as the saying goes prevention is better than cure.

Practice:

Attuned to such thread of thoughts and abreast with the knowledge to serve an audience who are always eager to learn, the NSS, Jangipur unit under the able guidance of its programme officer, Sushendu Biswas arranged for an awareness campaign to garner the support of students on this issue which was on the anvil for quite some time. No external speaker was invited for the event but the programme officer spoke extensively on this issue and made students aware how to take measures to prevent the mosquito borne diseases by playing active role in their daily lives, cleaning their sorroundings, not letting mosquitoes breed, not storing dirty water in their homes and sorroundings which is a perfect breeding ground for mosquitoes. Most importantly NSS student volunteers were taken to the adjacent poverty-stricken dominated by the minority population to raise consciousness among villagers regarding the potential threats of these diseases. Questionnaires were distributed

among students to make a quick survey of what they already knew about their environment and to provide a fresh perspective on this issue to improve on the present situation.

Evidence of Success:

Such awareness campaigns always demand mass participation which took place as many students attended the programme and worked in tandem with the programme officer by cleaning the boy's hostel of the college, emphasizing the use of dustbins and taking the pledge to repeat such activities around their homes and eliminate potential breeding grounds of mosquitoes. It was anticipated that the level of awareness would hopefully increase as student response was significantly high and positive. Some students gave suggestions to work with district medical teams and self-help groups to raise awareness levels among their neighbours and friends.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

As suggested by students' joint collaborations at district and state levels required to raise consciousness among common people was a good idea. Promoting such a cause would require funds that are a great motivating factor. Community based interventions like cleanliness drives by assessing knowledge and practices are essential. It also helps to be self-driven. When it comes to cleanliness drives there is no rural-urban divide. So students need to comprehend that since they are from rural areas they are not on a back foot to create a disease free clean environment for themselves and for others.

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
